#### **Parish Council News**

Much has been happening across the Parish since the Winter newsletter was published. We've summarised the best bits below:

**Pop-up Café**: The Pop-Up Café continues to be a popular event. **Tithe Barn Lane Crossing:** We are pleased to say that further to a complaint regarding the volume of bleepers KCC sent an engineer to turn the volume down to the minimum. This will hopefully enable nearby residents to continue their daily lives without the noise.

**Bike ability:** In collaboration with the KCC Warden we are planning to hold a bike ability course to raise awareness amongst cyclists of how to be road safe. This will be a half day course with half of the course theory and the other half spent outside doing practical work.

**The Big Lunch:** this event will be held on Sunday 7<sup>th</sup> of June 2020. Keep an eye on social media for more details.

#### HILLCREST HELPS CEMENT POSITIVE CHILDHOOD MEMORIES

Despite no longer having school-age children at home, I always know when the local kids are on holiday because at the allotments in Great Chart we invariably have an "incursion", sometimes involving low-level vandalism. It seems that some local children get so bored during the holidays that they deem it acceptable to walk around the parish making an absolute nuisance of themselves. There is, they complain, nothing to do.

Ironically, the damage they do at the allotment is almost pitiable: they smash things, trample down fences, and throw open shed doors looking for something to steal. What is it that they imagine they're going to find? Expensive Wolff gardening tools, perhaps; or is it high-end petrol strimmers, or mowers? They must be sorely disappointed. Our most notable loss in recent times was two cans of the cheapest, most horrible and disgusting canned lager it is possible to buy— which is what we use to spike slug-traps with. Slugs, in line with certain types of teenagers, don't seem to care what disappears down their throats, just so long as it is alcoholic and results in oblivion.

Yet it would wrong to characterise all young people visiting the allotment as a bunch of uneducated, uncivilised ne'er-do-wells.


As the days get longer, a Beaver Colony consisting of 6-8 year olds visits Hillcrest one evening a week and takes care of a small area specifically set aside for their efforts. Their several raised beds and open areas produce a multiple set of vegetables, despite the fact that, during the planting, the rather small children often prove a little too eager, trampling over recently sown crops in their excitement to do more and more. No phones, no tablets, nor any other electronic devices in sight and yet the kids are in Seventh Heaven.

The allotment has also proved useful in helping one particularly disadvantaged teenager find a direction in life. The individual concerned had a coordination disability (dyspraxia), which meant he attended a special school aimed more specifically at children on the autistic spectrum. Not academic at all, he wanted to grow plants and took on an allotment. He's now studying for horticultural qualifications and is employed by a local council's Parks and Gardens department. The allotment, quite literally, changed his life for the better.

Then there is a semi-retired plotholder who is proud of the fact that his grandson comes to the plot with him whenever he is able. The lad loves being at the allotment – because where else can you have such fun playing with the soil?! He's just one of many surreptitiously developing a love for the great outdoors and learning how to grow his own food.

That is exactly how I developed a love for growing fruit and veg: watching my own father turning a derelict back garden into a veritable Garden of Eden, whilst allowing me to grow vegetables of my own in a small patch specifically set aside for that. Those memories lay dormant for many years, set aside whilst I built a career and brought up a family. Then, in 1996, I got my first allotment – and it felt like I'd never been away. All those positive childhood experiences rekindled, the best being the digging up of the very first root of new potatoes, then taking the tubers home, cooking and eating them. They still taste great! For that joy, I shall always have my father to thank.

Shame then, with all the cultivation possibilities in front of them, that the band of unwanted youths to our site in Great Chart would rather identify with the slugs rather than see the soil as a potential gateway into something much healthier (in all senses of the word).




#### Pop Up Café and Information Hub

#### Chilmington – The Latest

As the new season springs into action, so has the Chilmington Management Organisation (CMO). One of the early tasks for the CMO Board has been the appointment of RMG as Estate Manager to provide the ongoing maintenance support for the development. Following a procurement process RMG have been appointed to work alongside the CMO to manage and maintain the open spaces and community facilities. RMG will also collect the rent charge sums payable by Chilmington residents. It is hoped that the CMO will manage some of the onsite landscaping by the end of the year, for which RMG will take on the responsibility of engaging a landscaping contractor. The CMO and RMG will work together to ensure the best possible environment for the residents of Chilmington and their neighbours.

The CMO's first premises will be opening soon on Chilmington Avenue, with both CMO and RMG staff being on site part time. As well as serving as the CMO Office, the building will also offer a community space and meeting room for hire. Look out for further information in the next Parish Newsletter.




