QUEEN ELIZABETH II 1926 - 2022



Great Chart with Singleton Parish Council were greatly saddened to hear of the passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II on Thursday 8th September 2022.

Due to official protocol our Council meeting was held at Great Chart war memorial purely to pay our respects. Vice Chair Cllr Sullivan laid some flowers and Chairman Cllr Wiffen read aloud the following words:

"First, let me formally record the deep sadness felt by Great Chart with Singleton parish council on the news of the death of our sovereign, Queen Elizabeth II

I have been surprised by my own reaction to the death of her Her Majesty the Queen. I was shocked by the short interval between the news that doctors were concerned about her health and the announcement from Buckingham Palace that she had died. A matter of hours.



Following this, a strange sense of personal loss, the end of an era, a portent of change.

The Monarchy, not something that impinged on the everyday life of most people, was quietly there, in the background, a steadying presence that was perhaps not as apparent as it might have been.

For the vast majority of people in this country, and indeed the world, the United Kingdom has had but one head of state, Queen Elizabeth II. Her passing, announced just four short days ago has had a profound effect in this and many other countries around the globe. Despite a well established plan for succession, a palpable sense of uncertainty filled the hours following her death. This uncertainty has been amplified by the almost simultaneous arrival of a new prime minister.

The death of Her Majesty the Queen has come as a sharp reminder of that underlying continuity.

We often refer to the Royal Family, and must remember that the Queen was its matriarch. Four children, eight grandchildren and twelve great grandchildren. While we have lost a sovereign, they have lost the head of their family - a mother, a grandmother and a great-grandmother and our first thoughts must be for them in their grief.

But the world continues to turn and we have a new King, King Charles III, and we can only hope that he lives up to the wonderful example set by his mother."

Please note: the remainder of this newsletter was produced before the news of Her Majesty's passing, and has been scheduled for delivery after her funeral, therefore the remainder of the newsletter has been printed in colour.








The Platinum Jubilee bench that was unveiled at the Big Jubilee Lunch has now been put into it's permanent home on the Viewing Point, next to the path that runs between Hoxton Close and Normandy Way. It has been treated and stained and will hopefully be a welcome place to stop and take in the views over Ashford or just rest your legs

















PARISH COUNCIL NEWS



After correspondence with a resident, work was started on clearing green waste and repairing a fence damaged by illegal dumping. The area is owned by the parish council and unfortunately local residents had been using the area to dump grass cutting and old branches. Please can we ask residents to dispose of their green waste sensibly and not to cause problems for others



After footpath AW234 was rerouted and the ground was cleared of brambles, funding was sourced to install new fencing around the new allotments area, and also to replace the fencing that was around the existing allotments as well. It is hoped that the new allotments will be allocated by the end of 2022 and the waiting list will then be considerably shorter



Each year the parish council nominates a resident to receive a County award for their volunteer work within the parish. As we have not been able to hold an Annual Parish Meeting for a couple of years, we had two awards to give out. The first was to Dave Gathern for his work with uniformed youth groups, and the second was to Jenny Tippen for her work in running the volunteer group responsible for the Ashford Community Woodlands



Another recognition award that we were finally able to give out post COVID was a Freedom of the Parish scroll awarded to Marjorie Brissenden. Marjorie has lived in Great Chart for more than NINE decades! She has many stories to tell and has been involved in village life for as long as most people can remember, especially with her beloved cricket. As a regular at our Pop Up Cafe, it seemed a fitting place to present her scroll over summer.





As usual, the Stewards have been out and about doing both planned maintenance, and in response to residents requests. This includes trimming back overhanging trees on the footpath between Lodge Close and Harvest Way, and cutting back vegetation that was covering the Bradbridge Green sign. The council is sometimes restricted in where we can help as it depends on who the land belongs to, but if we can't help, we will point you in the direction of those who can.





After a recent campaign by one of our councillors, KCC agreed to install Pedestrians Ahead signs and SLOW markings on the road that runs through the Ashford Community Woodlands. It was felt that the increasing number of cars needed to be made aware that many people cross over that road from a hidden crossing point. Please can we ask drivers to see the national speed limit on that road as a guide, not a target.











THOUGHTS FROM THE CHAIRMAN



Since our May meeting, I have had the honour of being elected chair of the parish council. I would like to thank the outgoing chair, Ian McClintock, for all his sterling work over the past few years. Ian remains a member of the council and I'm sure will return as chair, next year.

So, for me this feels a little like a caretaker role and I hope I can meet the high standards set by Ian as we go through to next year's parish council elections.

As many of you will know, we don't hold a full parish council meeting during August, but most of the committees will meet at some point during the month, to keep things ticking over. Our next full meeting takes place on Monday 10th October and I would encourage you to come along and see the council in action. Remember, the council exists to serve the needs of its' parishioners. Speaking of which, the council is currently planning the 2023-24 budgets, which will include the required spending for any of it's planned projects. Below is a little explanation of what the parish council has to do, and what it would like to do. But as I already said, we are here to serve the needs of parishioners, so what would **YOU** like us to do?



What do **YOU** want to see from **US**?

As a parish council we have to submit our budget requests to Ashford Borough Council in the December before the Financial Year starts the following April. This means we have to be good at planning ahead.

Here at Great Chart with Singleton we already manage the play park in Great Chart and the one opposite John Wesley School. We maintain the footpath and land between Hoxton Close/Strouts Road/Normandy Way, the flowerbed at the bottom of Singleton Hill and the poo bag dispensers and defibrillators that are placed throughout the parish.

We like to engage with residents during events we hold - such as our monthly Pop Up cafe's, twice yearly activity days at Singleton Environment Centre, and we have plans to host an annual event along the lines of our Big Jubilee Lunch.

However, the parish council is here to serve the needs and wants of it's parishioners. What would YOU like to see in the parish?

MEET YOUR COUNCILLOR




Each newsletter we introduce you to one of the councillors that make up your Parish Council—you may well recognise their faces already. In this issue Sally Gathern is answering your questions. She is councillor for the Singleton West Ward.

1) What is your name and what roles do you hold in the Parish?

My name is Sally Gathern. I am the Chair of the Amenities, Open Spaces and Environment Committee and I also sit on the Complaints Committee.

2) Tell us a bit about yourself.

I moved to Singleton with my family in 1995. We liked the area and the local school and felt it was where we wanted our children to grow up. I have held several community volunteer roles over the years and am currently Vice-President of the newly formed Singleton WI, Akela at 1st Great Chart Cubs and a Parish Councillor. I am also involved in children's work at Singleton Church and the Make Lunch project at St Francis Church. I have 7 children, 4 grown up, 3 still at home and attending local schools, and 2 granddaughters.



3) Why did you become a Councillor and what skills have you brought to the table?

I became a councillor about 10 years ago because I wanted to have a say in how our community was shaped. I am passionate about the environment and have attended many conferences and workshops to become better informed about conservation, climate change and related issues. As a former teacher I am also interested in, and have experience of, education and working with children.

4) What do you enjoy most about being a Councillor?

My favourite part of being a councillor is seeing a project come to fruition. It has been very exciting to see projects such as the creation of wildflower meadows and the North Field project taking shape after so much preparation and planning. I also enjoy engaging with local people, from all walks of life and generations, and hearing their ideas for our community.

5) What do you personally think is the most important part of the Council's work?

It's really quite impossible to choose one aspect of the council's work that is most important. We are a very active council and I feel the many, varied projects that our councillors are involved in all play a vital role in enhancing our community. At the risk of sounding cliched, our most important role is to serve the community we represent.

6) What do you feel is the Council's biggest achievement to date?

Again, I don't feel I could pick a single achievement. We make every effort to serve everyone in the community and our projects reflect that. Our pop-up cafes help alleviate loneliness, especially amongst our older residents, and the appointment of a Youth Officer will enhance our offering for young people locally. Our environmental projects enhance the local area for everyone and will help to build a more sustainable and enjoyable future for all.

7) What do you personally want to achieve as a Councillor in the future?

I would like to further improve our environment. One of the commonest complaints I hear from residents is about litter, so I am constantly working with other councillors to come up with ways to tackle this. I would love to create a community orchard, planting fruit trees that local people can take the fruit from. I have seen this in other local areas and it has worked very well.

8) What do you like to do in your spare time?

I love spending time with family and friends, reading, and walking in the local woodlands. But my favourite way to spend my free time is working on my allotment. I am a terrible gardener but I love the whole process of digging, planting and (hopefully!) growing food that my family can eat. Having an allotment has shown me just how much gardening can improve people's physical and mental health, as well as enhancing local biodiversity and ecosystems.

Our Big Jubilee Lunch took place on the Great Chart Playing Fields on 18th June 2022 in honour of the Queens Platinum Jubilee. We had a steady stream of visitors all day, and we were very impressed with

day! They will definitely reappear at any future large events we host. The queue for facepainting never


local groups who helped behind the scenes to make the day a success.

PARISH COUNCIL PROJECTS



Hello, I'm Sarah and I'm the Youth Worker for Great Chart with Singleton Parish Council I have been in post for almost 3 months now. In that time, I have been meeting lots of people. I've met groups and people who are already working in our parish, I've spoken to schools, and I've also spoken to young people, children and their parents about what they want to see happen in the parish. It's been great meeting so many new people and getting to know so many organisations that work in the area.

So having spoken to lots of people about what they want, the hope is that we will be launching some new groups for children and young people in the parish.

We hope to have a group for children aged 8 - 12 years old, a group for ages 13+, a youth forum, a project group and one street-based session (this is where youth workers go to parks, such as Cuckoo Park, and speak to the young people who are hanging out there). In order to do this, we are at the point where we are recruiting volunteers to help get these groups up and running. To do this we are working with the Volunteer Centre, and we will be posting about this on our social media accounts and on the noticeboards. When the groups are ready to go, we will also post about them on our social media accounts and on our noticeboards.

The Hall consists of the existing building which has 1 large Main Hall (approx. 140 people seated) and 1 small side room. There are kitchen & WC facilities including disabled.

The new building has the Extension Hall downstairs (approx. 60 people seated) with a fully fitted kitchen & WC facilities including disabled.

On the first floor is the Extension Hall upstairs is of a similar size (approx. 60 people seated) but can be divided off into two halls (approx. 30 people each) with a soundproof partition wall. This is accessed via a wide staircase or a lift for those with mobility issues There are WC facilities and a small tea/coffee making room with a sink.

SINGLETON ENVIRONMENT CENTRE / REPAIR CAFE

One of Singleton Environment Centre's biggest successes is the Ashford Repair Cafe. It is run in one of our workshops and continues to grow and grow. We've given them our page in this newsletter to

tell you more about what they do.



It was not very long ago, that when things were broken or wearing out, peop would always seek to repair, rather than replace them...

Here in 2022, we at Repair Cafe Ashford would like to thank all of you from our parish and further afield, who have thus far sought out our workshop with your broken belongings, giving us the chance to try to rescue them from the rubbish heap. In the last 12 months alone, we have received a plethora of puzzles to ponder - be they jigsaws of smashed porcelain, retro radios with wires galore, clocks to drive us cuckoo, vacuums that had bitten the dust, lamps in need of lightbulb moments, teddy bears in tatters... and in one case, part of a fridge door containing (guess what?..) a printed circuit board. That modern contraption had managed to reverse its function, illuminating the owner's food whilst the fridge door was closed.

Since our opening in 2018, hundreds of items have arrived at our doors, from people trying to boycott the throw-away, and support the Repair Cafe, culture. In return we have unscrewed, dismantled, drilled, sanded, remoulded, furrowed our brows... had a tea break... collaborated, reupholstered, rewired, stitched, up, clicked together, clamped, rescrewed, camouflaged, glued, brushed and soldered on...to repair around 70-80% of the items we have received.

Phew! Due to popular demand, in the last year, we have doubled our opening days, from two afternoons per month to running every Wednesday afternoon between 1pm - 4pm, at the Singleton Environment Centre Workshop. We share our experiences with others who want to buck the throwaway trend and set up Repair Cafes in other towns because we're always happy to see more people wasting less and fixing things. Nestled amongst one of the few leafier, birdsong-filled settings in Ashford, you might agree if you visit that we have plenty of inspiration to try.

Ashford Repair Cafe is a member of the international Repair Cafe organisation. We are a motley crew of ordinary people from varied backgrounds, volunteering our technical skills and experience for free, trying to reduce waste, make people smile and increase hope for a sustainable way of living. We run on donations and only charge for any parts you ask us to replace. We might just save your stuff from the tip and help to save some valuable repairing skills from being lost, by sharing them with younger generations. Our regular volunteers currently span age groups, from those in their 30s to their 80s - each contributing to an inspiring mix of life experiences and perspectives. We often find we have much more in common than boring stereotypes would have us believe as well.

So, if you've items at home and you keep thinking, "That'll come in handy" or "I'll get that fixed one day.." maybe next Wednesday is that day! Maybe you could save a little money, a few memories and prevent a tiny chunk of landfill too? Why not give it a try? Give a stuff about your stuff and dare to repair! Find Repair Cafe Ashford every Wednesday 1pm – 4pm, at the Singleton Environment Centre Workshop, Wesley School Road, AshfordTN23 5LW.

The set-aside areas will be cut down once a year at the end of the growing season, so the following year the set-aside areas will provide a welcoming habitat for insects, birds and wildflowers.

This policy is widely recommended by bodies such as The National Trust and the Church of England; more information can be found concerning churchyards on the Diocese of Canterbury website/Nature and your church.
