# Parish Council News, Projects & Events

The Parish Council has a planning committee who meet regularly to discuss planning applications within the parish boundary. At the moment, and for the foreseeable future, this includes all applications relating to the Chilmington development. For years the parish councillors have worked with Ashford Borough Council to ensure that the development is built in the way it was originally envisaged. There are currently two planning applications that have been appealed as far as the Planning Inspectorate, relating to a Waste Water Treatment Works, and a plot of 655 houses additional to the 5,750 already agreed for the area. The Parish Council objects to both of these applications and will be present at their inquiries when they occur later in the year. The reasons for objecting can be found within the minutes for the committee on the website for the months of September 2023 and May 2022 respectively.



A recent addition to Great Chart has been a new bookstop. Situated outside the village hall, this one takes the form of the mill that used to be situated behind what is now the hairdressers next to the Swan & Dog.

The much loved rocket bookstop has also been repaired and repainted and has now landed back in it's spot next to the pond on Kirk View and we know from the comments on our social media how much it has been missed.

So if you have any books that you have read and think others

should too, please drop them into one of the bookstops in our area.

Also in Great Chart, the Parish Council has officially taken responsibility for the War Memorial situated there. The War Memorial Trust that was previously responsible has been wound up and its duties have been transferred to the more permanent Parish Council. Before the Trust was closed, the remaining monies were used to fund a clean up of the memorial, and repainting of the names engraved into it.

The Parish Steward will tidy up the hedges surrounding the area in due course.

### SINGLETON COMMUNITY FRIDGE

### IS CHANGING THE WAY IT WORKS

We are making some changes to the way Singleton Community Fridge works to better support our residents. The Fridge will be moving to 'manned hours' which will be staffed by one of our dedicated volunteers and we will publicise timings as we settle into the new routine. The 4item rule will continue to apply and outside of the manned hours the fridge and pantry area will remain open for donations and for anything that would spoil before the end of the day.

We appreciate your patience and understanding as we trial these new arrangements. Our main goal is to reduce food waste whilst ensuring a fair distribution of the food we purchase or receive.

If you wish to see the fridge open more often, we ask you to think about volunteering with us and to contact the Parish Council with your details.

Great Chart with Singleton Parish Council hosted another Eat Well Spend Less roadshow in Singleton Village Hall on 7th August. Organised by Ashford Borough Council, these events bring together a number of helpful organisations to give advice and information to local residents.

Whilst we are changing the way we run the fridge slightly, we are still looking for local food businesses to donate surplus food to us rather than throw it away. Although we can't take food past it's USE BY date, we can take food past it's best before. And if you are a registered food preparation business, we can even take entire meals off you if you can label it with the ingredients.



The Coop store in Brookfield Road uses their national database to link up with food sharing groups, and once we contacted them, were very supportive of the fridge and donate food to it weekly. Store Manager Marc can explain more:

"Here at Coop we know that none of us can afford to throw away good food. That's why our stores give products that are going out of date to local community groups at the end of each day to prevent food waste, so far we've given away over 3m meals and counting.

We share our surplus food with not-for-profit groups like food banks and homeless shelters. We use the platform Caboodle to help us link up with these groups. At the end of the day my colleagues collect and bag up the items ready for collection. They range from fruit and veg to bakery items, and also include damaged items that would be thrown away but are perfectly good.

It's really important to me and my team to be able to share this food and help the local community in Ashford and surrounding areas."

### SINGLETON ENVIRONMENT CENTRE

It has been another wonderfully busy summer at Singleton Environment Centre with lots of families and children joining us for events. Our sincere thanks goes to Great Chart with Singleton Parish Council who continue to support the education work at the centre allowing us to run a range of activities to engage and encourage positive involvement in nature and the local environment in particular. In total over 400 participants have taken part in one of the Parish sponsored Summer 2024 events.

Wild Wednesdays ran on each Wednesday throughout the school holidays. The children attending these drop and leave sessions enjoyed a full day of outdoor fun. There was pond dipping, den building, team games, scavenger hunts and nature craft for the



children to choose from. The firepit cooking was incredibly popular with popcorn, pizzas, toasted muffins and s'mores being made and eaten!

Our term time Buggin' About sessions for pre-schoolers are so popular that we couldn't wait six weeks to run another session so Laura ran two family special sessions where the pre-schoolers could bring along their siblings to join in the fun. 46 children took part in nature craft, exploratory play, toasting marshmallows, mud kitchen play and water play.

The popular series of Nature Stories events continued with two sessions this summer. The first was Superworm with immersive storytelling of this popular tale. Everyone made a superhero cape, dug for hidden treasure, made a spider web dreamcatcher, painted a wooden insect fridge magnet, played superworm games and helped to make the longest paperchain superworm. The second session was another immersive telling of Zog after the May half term session was a sellout. The children made dragon wings, created potions to soothe Zog's sore throat, toasted marshmallows over the fire, hunted for princesses in the centre grounds, made stick swords and fought the knights.

We were delighted to welcome back Phil from Jaws n Claws with his fascinating reptiles. These animal handling sessions continue to be incredibly popular and this summer 150 participants attended to learn about the animals. The SEND friendly session allowed those requiring a quieter and calmer session to fully participate.

50 participants spent time searching for pond creatures during our Pond Dipping event. They were lucky enough to find newts, water scorpions, water beetles, ramshorn snails, pond snails, water boatman, pond skaters, caddisfly larvae and bloodworms. It was wonderful to see the enjoyment and fascination on all faces, young and old!

There was plenty of creativity taking place this summer on our Make It Day with children designing their own hats, bags, pencil cases and make up bags. We loved the nature themed designs and positive messages so many of you included in your designs. Attendees of the Clay Critters event made their own model insect out of clay to take home and paint.

For the remainder of 2024, we will be celebrating Halloween with our Brilliant Bats sessions on 30th & 31st October, and a Halloween themed Nature Stories session of Room on the Broom on the 29th.

The festive period will be celebrated with Elf School events on the 8th & 14th December, and a Reindeer event on 10th December.

Footprints Café will be running a Lunch with Santa and an after school Tea with Santa event on Tuesday 3rd December. Join us for food, activities and games with Father Christmas.

### **COUNCIL EFFORTS TO ENHANCE BIODIVERSITY**

The perilous state of biodiversity in the UK is well-documented. The State of Nature reports published in 2013, 2016 and 2019 highlighted this alarming decline. The latest report from September 2023 makes grim reading.

- 16% (or one in six) of 10,000 species assessed are at risk of being lost from the UK.
- This figure is much higher for some groups such as birds (43%), amphibians and reptiles (31%), fungi and lichen (28%) and terrestrial mammals (26%).
- The distribution of pollinators, including bees, hoverflies and moths, has decreased by 18% on average, while species providing pest control, such as the 2-spot ladybird, have declined by 34%.
- The abundance of all UK species studied has declined on average by 19% since 1970.
- Out of the habitats that are important for wildlife, only 14% were found to be in a good ecological state, including just 7% of woodlands.

The causes of this biodiversity decline are many and complex: changes in land use, pollution, the use of insecticides, herbicides, rodenticides, fungicides and other harmful chemicals, climate change, invasive alien species and direct exploitation of species and habitats. The scale and complexity of the challenges before us are daunting and, as Natural England explain, "It will take sustained and increasingly ambitious action from all of us ... to make change on the scale we need."

Great Chart with Singleton Parish Council and Ashford Borough Council are determined to take action to reverse this biodiversity decline in both rural and urban areas. We have:

- Invited experts from the Bumblebee Conservation Trust to walk around Singleton East and Singleton West wards with us and produce action plans for improving biodiversity.
- Left areas dotted around Singleton unmown as a first step to introducing areas of wildflowers and pollinator-supporting plants.
- Identified areas where we can introduce wetlands and ponds to provide essential water and water habitats for a variety of species of small mammals, birds and insects.
- Encouraged the installation of hedgehog highways.
- Designed a 'tree trail' through Singleton West as a fun activity to do outdoors while learning about the crucial role that different species of tree play in supporting ecosystems.
- Stopped using herbicides wherever possible, using natural weedkillers instead.
- Extended the community orchard in the Millennium Wood.
- Planted additional trees and hedges.
- Installed planters, made by the Repair Café at the Singleton Environment Centre, and planted lavender and other pollinator-supporting plants.
- Encouraged residents to participate in 'no mow May'.
- Shared information about dangerous invasive species such as the yellow-legged Asian hornet that kills our native bees.
- Supported the local allotment group, encouraging them to grow organically as much as possible.

Protecting and supporting biodiversity is essential for our food security and ecosystems but it also benefits human health. Research collated by the BMJ in January 2024 shows how engagement with nature boosts physical and mental health, lowers blood pressure and reduces stress. Separate research shows that nearness to, and use of, green spaces by children improves their emotional wellbeing, decreases their stress, lowers behavioural problems and enhances attention. The educational benefits of engagement with nature are huge.

Changing the way we manage our green spaces means changing the way we see and engage with nature. We need open areas of mown grass for recreation but we also need to recognise that many areas that have traditionally been mown, so as to look 'tidy', need to be managed differently if we are to reverse the decline in our insect and wildlife. Areas that might look 'untidy' are often being deliberately left to create better habitats. We appreciate that some residents find this change challenging but we



assure you it is vitally necessary for insects, animals and for us - for our health, our food security and our future. **NEWSLETTER PAGE 10**

### ALLOTMENTS

**EXPANDING INTO MARESTAIL -** Local residents may have noticed that there has been a lot of activity in the new expansion area at parish-supported Hillcrest Allotments, in Great Chart. While the additional space has been welcomed, it has come at a price: over half of the plots established in this area are covered by marestail (strictly speaking horsestail), a pernicious weed that dates back to the dinosaurs. this is not just true of the allotment. Many of the municipal flower beds, as well as local gardens, in and around Singleton, suffer from colonies of the same weed. Marestail is naturally covered in silicon, meaning that traditional weedkillers simply trickle off the plant and are not absorbed. In some cases, if you crush the leaves prior to spraying, some plants do die, but there is no guarantee. On grass paths, regular mowing effectively makes it impossible for it to retain a presence, but on allotment plots eradication is much trickier. The three worst affected plots at Hillcrest have yet to be offered to new plot holders. Instead, they have been covered in plastic for almost a year, which will weaken the marestail, but not kill it. To do that, you have to undertake "strip composting", which involves spraying the weed in situ with compost activator. The live plants readily absorb this,

misidentifying it as food, only to realise that what they have ingested is killing them. The dead plant and the activator are then broken down by soil bacteria into harmless nitrogen.

Easy, right? Sadly, not. While ground can be cleared rapidly, it can take several years to eradicate marestail altogether. This is because as marestail breaks the surface, it emits spores, which in turn generate more plants, so the onus at the allotment has been on breaking this cycle to prevent the weed colonising adjacent plots. And, slowly but surely, this is proving a success.





### **1ST GREAT CHART CUBS**


- We had another very busy term last summer with lots of outdoor activities (despite the almost perpetual rain!) including several hikes, a football session, athletics and wide games.

There are kitchen & WC facilities including disabled.

The new building has the Extension Hall downstairs (approx. 60 people seated) with a fully fitted kitchen & WC facilities including disabled.

On the first floor is the Extension Hall upstairs is of a similar size (approx. 60 people seated) but can be divided off into two halls (approx. 30 people each) with a soundproof partition wall. This is accessed via a wide staircase or a lift for those with mobility issues There are WC facilities and a small tea/coffee making room with a sink.

#### **GREAT CHART PLAYING FIELDS AND BUXFORD PAVILION**

There has been a lot going on at the playing fields over recent months. We hosted a jam packed summer of Parish Council and Pilgrims FC summer events, along with the annual Gurkha Peace Walk and a couple of private events.
